CLAUD HAMILTON'S RESIDENTIAL FLAT BUILDINGS 1919-1940

Architect Claud Hamilton (1892-1943) designed and built many distinguished neo-Classical and Art Deco dressed brick buildings in the Kings Cross area. The Institute of Architects (RAIA) lists several of Hamilton's grandest buildings on its Twentieth Century Significance Register. We are still discovering more of Hamilton's buildings.

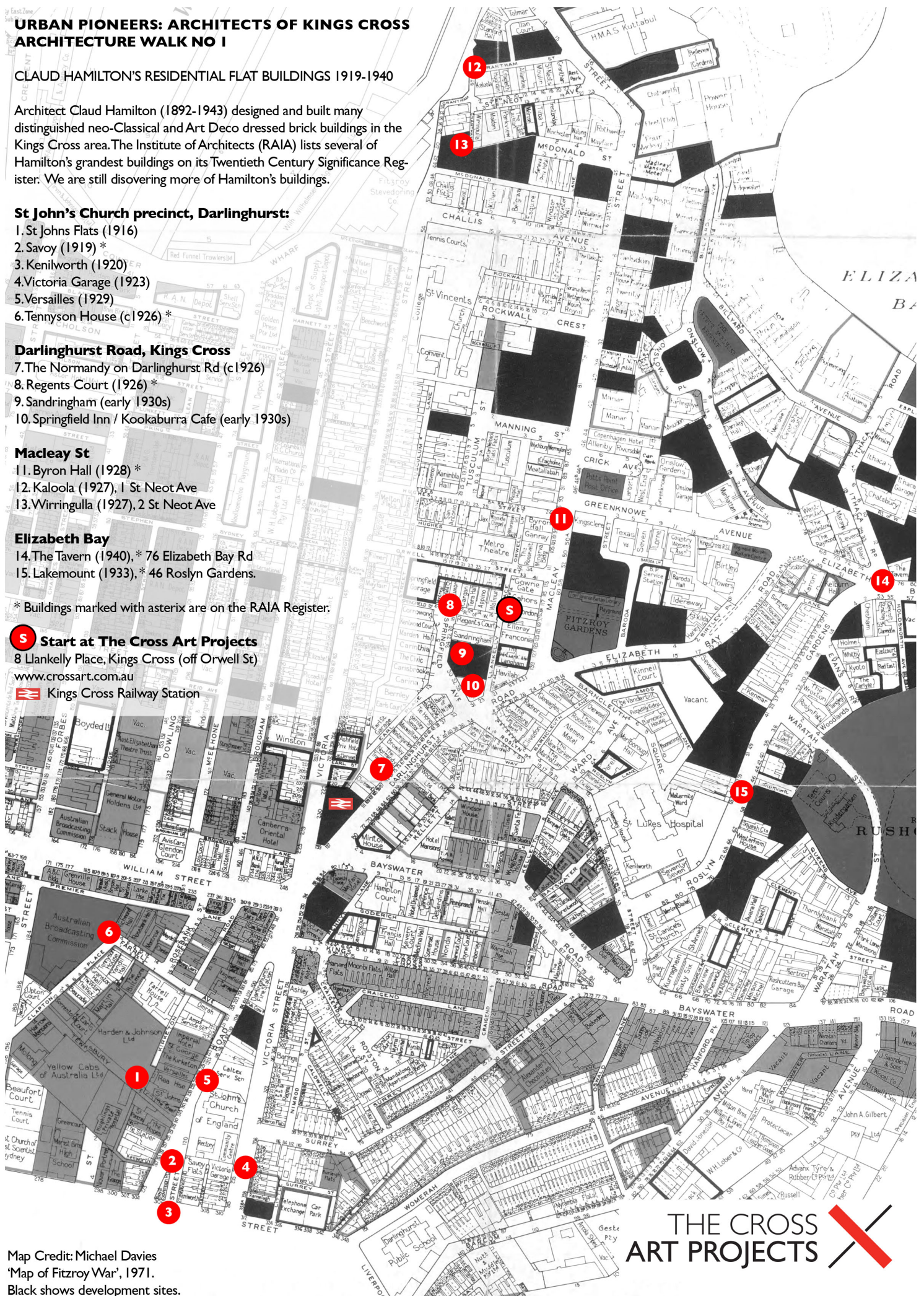
